Story Two: Young Vancouver teens win science award

Two teenage scientists from Vancouver, Raymond Wang, 17, and Nicole Ticea, 16, have each won a science **award**. They beat 1,700 of the world's best young scientists to win their awards. The top prize of 75,000 dollars went to Wang. He wanted to know why it is so easy for people get sick on an airplane. He found a way to improve the **flow** of air in airplane cabins so that passengers can breathe fresh air. At the same time, he found a way to **reduce** the amount of bad **germs** in the cabin air. His **device** stops the spread of serious illnesses among airplane passengers and could save thousands of lives. Ticea developed a device to test people for AIDS in poor countries. The device doesn't use electricity and can be thrown away. It is cheap and costs less than 5 dollars.

Story Three: BC raises fines for distracted driving

Do you drive and use your cellphone to text and talk? If you do, watch out! The province of British Columbia has just **raised** the **fine** to 368 dollars. The **distracted driver** will also have to pay an extra 175 dollars for **penalty points**. This brings the total to 543 dollars if it is the first time the person is caught. The fines and penalty points will go up each time the police catch a driver using their cellphone. The government says that if a person is caught using their cellphone twice in one year, that person could be **banned** from driving. Graduated Licensing Program drivers (new drivers) could also face a driving ban of 6 months if they are caught texting and talking. The new rules will start on June 1st.

Story Four: Young mother gives birth to quadruplets in Alberta BC
